She can be heard as the soloist in Georgia State University's upcoming recording of Duruflé's *Requiem*, which will be released by Gothic Records later this spring.

Sofia has received numerous accolades, including winning the Buffalo-Toronto District of the Metropolitan Opera's Laffont Competition, winning first place in the NYSMTA Heddy Killian Vocal Competition, and placing third in Eastman's Friends of Eastman Opera Competition.

ABOUT THE PRIZES

The Lynne Clarke Vocal Prize was established in 2003 from a fund created in 1998 by John Clarke in memory of his late wife and continues to be supported through the generosity of John's widow, Stephanie Cooper-Clarke. John and Lynne were founding members of the Friends of Eastman Opera.

The Annabel Muenter Vocal Prize was established in 2012 to honor the memory of Ms. Annabel Muenter, a lifelong opera lover and longtime board member of Friends of Eastman Opera.

MEET THE COLLABORATIVE PIANISTS

Collaborative pianist **Rebecca Golub** is currently an adjunct professor in RIT's College of Liberal Arts, where she teaches private piano lessons and serves as the pianist for their university choir. She is finalizing her DMA in Piano Accompanying and Chamber Music with a minor in Vocal Coaching at Eastman, where she studies with Dr. Andrew Harley. Rebecca holds an MM in Collaborative Piano from CU Boulder, and a BM from Eastman. This summer, she is thrilled to be joining the faculty of the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival as head vocal coach and collaborative pianist of the Opera Workshop.

Maeve Berry is a collaborator who finds immense joy in working with both singers and instrumentalists. At Eastman, Maeve is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts in Piano Accompanying and Chamber Music with Dr. Andrew Harley and holds a graduate assistantship in both studio accompanying and music theory. She has appeared at numerous festivals nationally and internationally including Toronto Summer Music Festival, SongFest, and Source Song Festival.

Hanyun Gu was born in Suzhou, China and began her music education at the age of six; received her Bachelor's degree in Music Education from the Shanghai Conservatory of Music, and continued her studies at the Manhattan School of Music, where she earned a Master's degree in Piano Performance and a Professional Certificate in Collaborative Piano. She is currently pursuing the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano Accompanying and Chamber Music at the Eastman School of Music, where she holds a Graduate Assistantship in Studio Accompanying, studying with Dr. Andrew Harley.

MEET THE COLLABORATIVE PIANISTS

German-American pianist Hannah Harnest recently established the critically-acclaimed Music for Thought Series in New York, collaborating with the German Consulate, the Fritz Ascher Society for Persecuted, Ostracized, and Banned Art, New Chamber Ballet, Leo Baeck Institute, 1014-New York, Nicholas Roerich Museum, and James Conlon on concerts considering the intersection of music and cultural events. In March, she is invited to the international art song competition Das Lied with soprano Alexandra Flood and in the summer she will join Seagle Festival as a vocal coach. At Eastman, Hannah is pursuing her Doctorate in Musical Arts with Andrew Harley.

Chun-Hsin (Cynthia) Liu, originally from Kaohsiung, Taiwan, is now pursuing her DMA degree in Piano Accompanying and Chamber Music at the Eastman School of Music, where she holds a Graduate Assistantship in Studio Accompanying, Opera Pianist Assistantship in the Voice and Opera Department and studies with Dr. Andrew Harley. Cynthia is also a receiver of the William and Joycelyn Macy Sloan Scholarship (2021-2022), the Barbara M. H. Koeng Award (2021) and Excellence in Accompanying Awards (2022).

Kelly Soderdahl McNeilly, originally from Iowa City, is pursuing an MM in Piano Accompanying and Chamber Music at the Eastman School of Music, where he studies with Dr. Andrew Harley. In 2016, he received a BA in Music and Mathematics from St. Olaf College, where he studied piano with Dr. Kent McWilliams, as well as viola. Since then, he has also served as a freelance collaborative pianist, working with undergraduate and graduate students at the University of Iowa.

22ND ANNUAL VOICE COMPETITION ADJUDICATOR

Artistic Director **Priti Gandhi** joined Portland Opera in the fall of 2021 as an artistic and strategic leader, as part of a new leadership team structure for the company. Her role leads the discussions for season planning, casting, development of the young artist program, and oversight of the company's community engagement and educational programs.

Previous to her post in Portland, she was Chief Artistic Officer at Minnesota Opera, where she advised on topics related to company programming, casting, and commissions related to the New Works Initiative. She also created new processes for company-wide conversations regarding diversity in traditional narratives and casting – most notably, exploring the growing discussion of the relevance of the operatic canon in the evolving lens of today – and has become a frequent contributor to panels, podcasts, and published articles regarding the ongoing dialogue of new perspectives in the traditional repertoire. Ms. Gandhi has also served on a number of advisory panels regarding grants and commissions for new work relating to BIPOC stories, including the National Endowment for the Arts, Arts Midwest, IDEA grants with Opera America, Atlanta Opera's 96 hour project, and American Lyric Theater.

She is also passionate about connecting to singers regarding career paths and resources, as well as creating more empowering spaces for artists in the industry – speaking on panels hosted by Opera America (The Changing Audition Landscape, the New Works Forum), The Asian Opera Alliance, Boston Lyric Opera (The Butterfly Process), the Broadway EPIC conference, and various opera companies and universities throughout the region.

In her performance career, she has appeared with the New York Philharmonic, Los Angeles Opera, Seattle Opera, Théatre du Châtelet in Paris, the Prague Estates Theatre, Philadelphia Orchestra, and San Francisco Opera, among others. Ms. Gandhi graduated with a BA in communications and a minor in theater from the University of California, San Diego. An alumna of programs at Cleveland Opera and San Diego Opera, Ms. Gandhi is also an amateur painter and flamenco dancer.
