~ PROGRAM NOTES ~

It is Black History month and The Eastman Jazz Ensemble is excited to present an evening of music highlighting the influence and innovation that Miles Davis brought to jazz from the '40's up until his death in 1991.

We are celebrating Miles' legacy, highlighting the arrangements of faculty member Prof. Charles Pillow.

Davis left a vast legacy with his recordings. In tonight's concert we are focussing on his earlier works and late 60's works, including compositions by Victor Feldman and Gil Evans. The ensemble is especially excited to perform the arrangements of faculty member Charles Pillow, highlighting works from his recent *Electric Miles* Project. He produced and arranged two albums of the music of Davis-penned tunes aptly celebrated the music of the jazz legend within the 1969-72 period, of which he also conducts and performs on. Summit Records released *Electric Miles* and *Electric Miles Vol. II* - Charles Pillow Large Ensemble respectively in 2018 and 2023.

More on Charles Pillow's Electric Miles albums:

The sound of **Bitches Brew** – the bass clarinet and multiple keyboards – was unheard of at the time. Almost every aspect of this 1969 release was new; the loose, yet guide-post like structures in the music, the post production techniques that Teo Macero used putting it together, the fact that it was a double album, even the liner notes, all pointed to a new direction in jazz. On *Electric Miles*, Pillow and his large ensemble draws attention to the music that featured jazz stalwarts such as **Herbie Hancock**, **Chick Corea, Lenny White, Jack DeJohnette, John McLaughlin, Joe Zawinul, Wayne Shorter, Dave Liebman** and **Dave Holland**. *Electric Miles* centers around compositions from *Bitches Brew, Jack Johnson*, and *In a Silent Way* – all skillfully arranged for big band.

Originally from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Pillow studied at Loyola University before pursuing his Masters Degree in Jazz Studies at the prestigious Eastman School of Music, in Rochester, NY. Since moving to NYC in 1987, he has appeared on over 100 recordings with both jazz and pop luminaries such as Frank Sinatra, Mariah Carey, Jay Z, Luther Vandross, Paul Simon, Brad Mehldau, Michael Brecker, Bruce Springsteen, John Scofield, Tom Harrell, Dave Liebman, David Sanborn, to name a few. In addition to an active performing and recording schedule, he is an Assistant Professor of Jazz Saxophone at the Eastman school of Music.

~ MEET THE ARTISTS ~

Clay Jenkins' career as a jazz artist has covered a wide range of musical experiences and responsibilities, bringing him to the forefront of the jazz performing and teaching arenas.

Clay's experience as a performer began at an early age, playing and recording with the Stan Kenton Orchestra. In 1978, Clay moved to Los Angeles, where he was in demand as a performer and studio recording musician, and toured with the big bands of Buddy Rich and the Count Basie Orchestra.

Since moving to Rochester, New York in 2000 to join the Eastman faculty, Clay has maintained a busy performing, recording, and teaching schedule. He has remained active throughout the United States and abroad. Clay continues to perform and record with the Clayton/Hamilton Jazz Orchestra, of which he is a charter member and whose trumpet section also included the great Eugene "Snooky" Young (1919-2011).

Clav's close friendship with Snooky Young led to three guest appearances at Eastman by the great trumpet player, and Clay recently established the "Snooky Young Endowed Scholarship" at Eastman to assist under-represented minority students. Clay is currently writing a biography of Snooky Young's life.

Clay has performed on over one hundred recordings. He has released seven solo recordings under his name, and as a co-leader, he has recorded with Gene Bertoncini, Kim Richmond, and Don Aliquo. Additionally, Clay has also recorded with Joe LaBarbera's Quintet, The Clayton/Hamilton Jazz Orchestra, Harold Danko, Rufus Reid, Alan Ferber, and Charles Pillow. Clay also records with his Eastman colleagues Jeff Campbell and Rich Thompson as "Trio East." Clay's latest recording project, soon to be released, included guitarists Gene Bertoncini and Larry Koonse, drummers Joe La Barbera and Jeff Hamilton, and bassist John Clayton.

Clay attended North Texas State University (now the University of North Texas) where he earned his bachelor's degree in music theory. He received his master's degree in jazz studies from the University of Southern California.

Clay plays Edwards Trumpets and is a performing artist for The Edwards Instrument Company.

Graced with an "impeccable" voice (Winnipeg Free Press) and hailed as an artist who "may well turn out to be the next important jazz singer" by the LA Times, two-time GRAMMY Award® nominated vocalist Sara Gazarek has been one of the leading lights of an impressive generation of jazz vocalists since her brilliant emergence at age 20. While her subsequent career has been the picture of success - highlighted by five critically acclaimed albums, numerous world tours, an ardent fanbase, enthusiastic reviews, a teaching position at the University of Southern California and collaborations with such luminaries as Kurt Elling, Fred Hersch, Billy Childs and Larry Goldings, it is with her latest double-GRAMMY® nominated album, Thirsty Ghost, and most recent four-song EP, Vanity, that Gazarek brings her musical expression stunningly into phase with her emotional maturity. Gazarek is a founding member of the all-female, GRAMMY® nominated vocal ensemble, säje, and currently serves as Governor of the Los Angeles Chapter of the Recording Academy.
